# RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AT BIERTON

### Christian Value of the half-term

This half-term we have been focusing on: Respect

## **Phonics at Bierton**



#### How do I listen to my child read?

Your child has a Storybook matched to the sounds and words they know – a decodable book – so they should be able to read all the words.

Please avoid saying, "This book is too easy for you!" but instead say "I love how well you can read this book!"

#### 'Special Friends', 'Fred Talk', read the word

Remind your child to read words using 'Special Friends, Fred Talk, read the word' (see glossary).

For example 'ship': spot the 'sh', then Fred Talk and blend to read the word e.g. sh, sh-i-p, ship.

#### **Red Words**

Red Words are also known as common exception or tricky words. They occur in stories regularly (said, what, where) but have unusual letter combinations ('ai' in the word 'said' makes the sound 'e').

Remind your child not to use Fred Talk to read Red Words but instead to 'stop and think'.

Tell them the word if you need to.

#### Read the same book again and again

Children love reading the same book again and again. Their reading becomes speedier and they understand what they are reading.

Encourage your child to read words using 'Fred in your head'.

Show your child how to read the story in a storyteller voice.

Share your enjoyment of the story when they read it again and again.

### **New Phonics Groups**

This week you will have received notification of your child's new phonics group.

The children have been working really hard in phonics and many of them have moved up to the next stage.

This week your child should have received a new book to match the colour of their group. Reading this at home is really important for their phonic progress.

You will have also received the links to the RWI virtual classroom. This videos are closely matched to what your child will be learning in their phonics lesson. Please encourage your children to watch these videos to support with their phonics progress.



## Maths at Bierton

#### Famous Mathematicians.

As our children are gaining a wider understanding of the world, we thought we would share some information about famous mathematicians.

#### Florence Nightingale

#### Key facts:

Life: 1820 - 1910

Nationality: British

Areas of expertise: Statistics

#### Achievements:

- Florence studied mathematics from an early age as her parents had strongly endorsed women's education.
- Years before she began learning mathematics, she had developed skills in collecting, organising and presenting data.
- Her devotion to mathematical practice and the study of statistics drove her throughout her subsequent career in nursing and medical reform.
- Nightingale set about collecting statistics in Crimea. She
  treated this activity—counting the number of soldiers killed,
  injured or diseased—in the same way biologists collected
  specimens of butterflies and fossils on field trips.
- Like many collectors, she employed other people to collect statistics on her behalf, running a team of data-gatherers at the Crimea.

### Mathematical Coverage

#### Time

Over the next few months, many classes will be learning about time. Being able to tell the time (both on analogue and digital clocks) is an essential life school. Here is an overview of some of the things covered in different year groups:

### Year 3 visit to the Natural History Museum

Last month, Year 3 went to the Natural History Museum in Tring to kickstart their Science learning about animals, including humans. While we are at the museum, the children participated in a workshop about classification. They learnt the difference between vertebrates and invertebrates and then explored how different vertebrates are classified. During the activity, they had to discuss many things about the animals they were observing, for example: whether they were hot or cold blooded; whether they gave birth to live young or laid eggs; what their body was covered in and how they breathe.

As well as participating in the workshop, the children enjoyed exploring the different galleries in the museum. They compared different skeletons, looked at the features of different animals and looked at different locations where each animal may live

Since returning from their trip, Year 3 have been learning about the human skeleton, muscles and joints in science. In Literacy this half term, the children are applying some of the things they have learnt when learning how to write a non-chorological report based on skeletons.
